The Jesus Nut!

There has been a British naval presence in the Gulf since the early nineteenth century when its role was both to protect the trade routes in the area by limiting piracy, and also to curtail the slave trade. Indeed, Bahrain was a part of the British Empire up to 1971, and it was in that year that HMS Juffair was finally handed over to the US Navy, since when it has been the base of the US Fifth Fleet. However, at the behest of Hamad bin Isa Al Khalifa, the Cambridge educated King of Bahrain, the United Kingdom was invited back, and in 2015, he began to build what is now the Naval Support Facility that looks after our ships out there. Co-located is the United Kingdom Maritime Command Component together with a number of individuals who work in the Combined Maritime Force. This is an international force with personnel drawn from nearly fifty countries.

This naval facility includes a Welfare Block where there is a chapel. Inside the chapel are the usual ecclesiastical furnishings including a cross on the wall.

Behind the cross is a metal ring called “the Jesus nut”.

This, it turns out, is the main rotor mast retaining nut: a key component of the helicopter, without which the aircraft is useless. It sits on top of the rotor head and basically, it holds the rotor blades in place. Without it, they would simply drop off.



It is fascinating that somewhere in the past, someone recognised the function of this piece of metal and likened it to Jesus. Without it, the helicopter is lifeless ... it can't take off ... it can go nowhere. With it, the aircraft's full potential can be realised. I cannot think of a modern piece of kit that could possibly beat the Jesus Nut as an apt item to place behind the Cross.

So my question is, “What’s holding our lives together these days, both as individuals and as a church?”
